

Immigration and Naturalization Filing Fees Set to Rise

The U.S.C.I.S. (Citizenship and Immigration Services) is proposing large filing fee increases for most immigration and naturalization petitions. No one knows exactly when the increases will come, since there is considerable opposition to them, with hearings held in the House and Senate. In the past, fee increases have been fairly minimal, but these are not. For instance, the fee for the popular fiancé petition is slated to cost \$455

instead of the current \$170. If the proposal goes through, the fee to renew a Green Card will rise to \$290 (from \$160) plus a fingerprinting fee of \$80. The citizenship application will cost \$670 (now \$400). A Refugee Travel Document will cost \$305 (instead of \$170). A Petition for an Alien Relative (parents, spouse, children, siblings) will cost \$355 (from \$170). Work Authorization will go up to \$340 (from \$180). Other

applications have similar increases.

The government claims that these fee increases are necessary to improve service and cut processing times. There is a 65 page explanation of these fees available, if anyone would like to look at it. It seems to me that these fees are very excessive and will cause even more difficulties for those seeking to immigrate relatives and obtain citizenship. For families, they will be unaffordable.
